Saint Paul University History

The origin of Saint Paul University dates back to September 26, 1848, when “The College of Bytown” was founded by Bishop Joseph-Eugène Guigues, O.M.I., who in 1856 officially entrusted the College to the Oblates of Mary Immaculate.

In 1861 the College of Bytown was renamed “College of Ottawa” and on August 1866, was granted university status by the Government of the Union of Canada. By letters of Leo XIII, dated February 5, 1889, the College of Ottawa was granted the pontifical charter.

To meet the requirements of Pius XI’s Ap-ostolic Constitution, Deus Scientiarum Dominus, on the reorganization of Catholic universities, the administration revised its pontifical charter which was subsequently approved by Rome on November 15, 1934. The civil charter, which had been rewritten, was approved on April 18, 1933 by the Ontario Provincial Legislature and the University was henceforth officially known as “University of Ottawa”.

In the years following World War II, the University progressed rapidly and by 1965, had established nine faculties and four schools. The year 1965 marked the end of one era and the beginning of another. On July 1st, through an Act of the Ontario Provincial Legislature and after laborious negotiations between the University and the Provincial Government, the institution heretofore designated as the University of Ottawa became Saint Paul University, nonetheless keeping its civil and canonical charters. At the same time the Provincial Government formed a new institution to be known as the University of Ottawa to which Saint Paul University conceded the majority of its holdings. The two Universities became a federated complex and according to mutual agreement were to share faculties.

In addition to conferring its own degrees, Saint Paul University reserves the right to present its candidates to the Senate of the University of Ottawa for the joint conferment (Saint Paul University - University of Ottawa) of its certificates, diplomas and civil degrees.

Both Universities consider themselves complementary institutions. Saint Paul University appoints eight members to the Board of Governors of the University of Ottawa. The Rector of Saint Paul University is a member of the Senate of the University of Ottawa, and the Faculties of Saint Paul University are also represented in the academic Senate of the University of Ottawa by their Dean, Secretary and a professor elected by his or her colleagues. Moreover, the two Universities benefit from a mutual exchange of professors and they mutually recognize their courses.

Saint Paul University with strong traditions is fully aware of its special mission and possibilities. Its geographical location, its bilingual character, its federation with the University of Ottawa, its competent and diversified teaching staff, contribute to the quality of the academic training and the Christian culture which it endeavours to guarantee.

Mission Statement

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4 Saint Paul University, in Ottawa, is a Catholic and bilingual institution entrusted for more than a century and a half to the Congregation of the Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate. Endowed with civil (1866) and pontifical (1889) charters, Saint Paul University has been federated with the University of Ottawa since 1965.

As a Catholic institution, Saint Paul University is dedicated primarily to an understanding and integration of Christian faith and life. It intends to pursue this task in a spirit of ecumenical openness and with a critical awareness of the forms of Christian life already existing or now emerging within modern cultures and societies.

As a bilingual institution, Saint Paul University wishes to contribute to the mutual understanding and enrichment of the English- and French-speaking communities, while remaining attentive to the cultural diversity of the country.

As a centre of higher learning, Saint Paul University intends, within the local, national and international academic community, to promote excellence in teaching, research, and professional formation. It endeavors as well to serve diverse Christian communities and socio-cultural organizations and, in collaboration with them, to try to meet the challenges presently confronting Church and society.

Thus, by participating in the evangelizing mission of Christ, Saint Paul University hopes to contribute creatively to the humanization of society.

Goals

1. To promote, within a context of academic freedom and interdisciplinary exchange, a climate enhancing university activity which takes seriously contemporary developments in the sciences and other fields of knowledge.
2. To foster, in the light of faith and with full respect for each person, the integral development of members of the university community.
3. To assure the human and material resources necessary for a vigorous academic environment.
4. To generate the means necessary for the communication and exchange of knowledge and the results of scholarly research.
5. To establish and maintain relationships with appropriate ecclesial and social bodies.
6. To be a meeting place between the Church and the various contemporary cultures, religions and specialized fields of knowledge.
7. To assert and protect through appropriate means the bilingual character of the University.
8. To encourage critical awareness of present ethical concerns.
9. To create a greater sensitivity to current social justice issues.
10. To be attentive to the educational needs of the individuals and groups it is called upon to serve, and to answer these needs as adequately as possible.
11. To develop relevant teaching and research programs.

The aim of this Centre founded in 1967 is to promote studies in Canadian religious history, by sponsoring research and organizing meetings of specialists in the field. For that purpose, the Centre prepares research tools such as bibliographies, indexes and various catalogues. It also collects historical documents, particularly of untapped sources accessible to few researchers. Since 1977, the Centre has been working on the listing and microfilming of Roman documents concerning Canadian religious history. On top of its own records, the Centre keeps on deposit the archives of other institutions, including the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops and the Canadian Religious Conference.

General Structure of Bachelors

In most cases, bachelors are composed of foundational courses, of a discipline specific component and of electives. The foundational courses may vary from one Faculty to another. Refer to the section entitled “Program Descriptions” of each faculty presenting the discipline-specific component of each bachelor program.

Options

Saint Paul University offers 109 possible program combinations at the Bachelor level. You can study in two disciplines simultaneously without extending the duration of your studies. These combinations are:

Honours (60 cr.) + minor (30 cr.) = 4 years full-time (for a total of 120 cr.)

Major (42 cr.) + major (42 cr.) = 4 years full-time (for a total of 120 cr.)

Major (42 cr.) + minor (30 cr.) = 4 years full-time (for a total of 120 cr.)

Minor (30 cr.) + minor (30 cr.) = 3 years full-time (for a total of 90 cr.)

Auditor: student who is authorized to enroll in a course but is not entitled to write exams or to submit assignments. Recognition of this status is limited to a confirmation of attendance.

Full-time Student: student whose main occupation is to take courses on a full-time basis (registered for 12 credits or more per session) at Saint Paul University.

Part-time Student: student who is registered during one academic year to fewer than 12 credits per session at the undergraduate level or to a maximum of two half-courses per session at the graduate level.

Regular Student: student who is registered in courses for credit and works towards a degree or certificate.

Special Student: student who is registered in courses for credit but is not working towards a degree or certificate or diploma at Saint Paul University, and does not need to comply to the requirements of a particular program. This student must nevertheless observe academic regulations: attendance, assignments, examinations, and passing mark.

Registration

At the beginning of each session, all students must register in person on the day, time and place set for registration. All persons taking courses at Saint Paul University must be duly registered. Students must pay their tuition fees by the dates indicated in the Academic Calendar. Unless otherwise indicated, part-time students can register by mail.

Maintaining Registration

All doctoral candidates who have completed their mandatory residence as full-time students and who continue to work on the preparation or writing of their thesis must continue to register at the beginning of each session and pay the tuition fees set by the Council of Administration. Students can request a leave of absence from their academic unit for a given session. During this leave, they do not have a right to use the services of the University, nor to the council of their Research Advisor or Thesis Director.

Change in Registration

No course changes or status changes will be authorized after the deadlines published in the Academic Calendar.

Cancellation of Registration

The student who decides to withdraw from a course is responsible for submitting the duly signed form to the Academic Assistant of his or her Faculty.

Exchange of Services

A student registered in a Faculty at Saint Paul University can follow courses in another Faculty at Saint Paul University or at the University of Ottawa if the following conditions are met:

- i) prior authorization has been obtained from his or her Faculty;
- ii) acceptance is granted by the host Faculty;
- iii) he or she has duly registered for this course.

Pending these same conditions, students registered in a Faculty at the University of Ottawa can take courses at Saint Paul University.

UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMS

Certificate

A 24 to 30-credit independent program offering basic training in a discipline.

General Bachelor

A 90-credit program (3 years) offering basic intellectual training and general culture, while facilitating the acquisition of basic training in one or two disciplines (minors).

Honours Bachelor

A 120-credit program (4 years) of which 60 credits in one discipline. The honours bachelor offers in-depth training in a discipline and provides preparation for graduate studies in the same discipline.

Major

Complementary 42-credit program in which students may register as part of a bachelor. The purpose of the major is to provide intermediate training in a discipline. Combined with a second major or a minor, the major provides preparation for graduate studies in a discipline.

Minor

Complementary 30-credit program in which students may register as part of a bachelor. The purpose of the minor is to offer basic training in a discipline.

Joint Honours Bachelor

A 120-credit program (4 years), of which 48 credits in each of two complementary disciplines. The joint honours bachelor offers in-depth training in two disciplines and provides preparation for graduate studies in these disciplines.

Coop

Part of a bachelor program, an option that offers, through internships in the workplace, practical training which is complementary to knowledge acquired in the classroom.

GRADUATE PROGRAMS**Graduate Certificate**

Post-graduate university studies program, without thesis or dissertation, consisting of 15 credits of Master's level courses.

Master's

Post-graduate university studies program, generally characterized by a research component (thesis or dissertation). The program is of at least one year and comprises 24 credits or more.

Licenciate

Post-graduate university studies ecclesiastical program, generally characterized by a research component (thesis or dissertation), consisting of 54 to 84 credits.

Doctorate

Doctoral university studies program. Oriented mainly toward research, it includes a thesis and defense of the thesis.

Civil Program

Program approved by the Ontario Government. Degrees are conferred jointly by Saint Paul University and the University of Ottawa.

Ecclesiastical Program

Degrees are conferred by Saint Paul University by virtue of its pontifical charter.

Distance Education

Courses available to off-campus students. Saint Paul University offers distance education via videoconferencing and the Internet.
