The Faculty of Philosophy's programs offer students opportunities to work in businesses in Ottawa and with the Public Service of Canada. ### PUBLIC ETHICS

Public ethics treats of the most fundamental societal and governmental questions raised in an era in which societies and states are undergoing profound societal and political changes. In public ethics, one analyses in depth questions related to governmental ethics: ethics and democracy; ethics and the legislator; political and economic ethics; institutional and politico-administrative ethics; the ethics of international relations; ethical concerns of those who act in the public realm. One examines as well social ethical questions: social justice; the redistribution of riches and resources; concerns of various collectivities; values and principles at the basis of contemporary social organization; role of civil society and social actors in the dynamics of social and political life; social ethics projects.

Many of the choices available to individuals are determined by decisions made at the level of public institutions (governments, the legal system, regional health authorities, and hospitals). Public ethics reflects on the decisions that shape the infrastructure of our society and affect the behavior of the individual citizen.
