

Rooted in the Roman Catholic tradition, embracing other Christian traditions – Ukrainian Catholic, Anglican, Orthodox, and others – and inserted in a multicultural context, the Faculty of Theology offers an exciting and dynamic context of faith seeking understanding for an intelligent reflection on the major issues of our time.

Theological studies prepare students for informed and responsible involvement in a variety of ecclesial, educational, health care, correctional, military, and governmental settings, always in view of serving the Gospel through the promotion of human dignity.

Consisting of a faculty of over 25 world-renowned professors supported by a dedicated administrative staff, the Faculty of Theology offers personalized, quality scholarship attentive to its international, multicultural student population of all ages and drawn from all walks of life. The Metropolitan Andrey Sheptytsky Institute of Eastern Christian Studies and the Anglican Studies Program (in coordination with the Anglican Diocese of Ottawa) add welcome elements to the Faculty's distinctiveness.

The Faculty's undergraduate and graduate (certificate, bachelor, master's, and doctoral) programs lead to ecclesiastical and/or civil degrees. Ecclesiastical degrees are conferred by Saint Paul University by virtue of its pontifical charter; civil degrees are conferred jointly by Saint Paul University and the University of Ottawa by virtue of their federation.

Most undergraduate programs are offered both in French and in English, the University's two official languages, with timetables designed to allow students to take courses in either language. Most graduate programs are offered in French and English together. These two modalities of bilingualism open wider vistas to students and better prepare them to dialogue with others in the Church and society.

The Faculty publishes a refereed, bilingual (French, English) theological journal, THEOFORUM, which appears three times a year. Articles deal with various topics of interest to the theological community. The Editorial Board consists of the Editor-in-Chief, two Book Review Editors, the Chair, and the Managing Editor, with members of the board of editorial consultants selected both from the Faculty and from outside the University.

The Anglican Studies Program

The Anglican Studies Program was established by Saint Paul University and the Anglican Diocese of Ottawa in 1981 in order to prepare candidates for lay and ordained ministry in the Anglican Church through university level theological formation. The program concentrates on characteristic dimensions of Anglicanism, including its history, liturgy and mission. The program provides a unique opportunity for those who wish to explore the Anglican tradition within the ecumenical and bilingual context of the Faculty of Theology.

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Metropolitan Andrey Sheptytsky Institute of Eastern Christian Studies (MASI)

The Metropolitan Andrey Sheptytsky Institute of Eastern Christian Studies is an integral part of Saint Paul University's Faculty of Theology. It is named after the primate of the Ukrainian Catholic Church, Andrey Sheptytsky (1865-1944), who dedicated his life to furthering East-West understanding and the rapprochement between the Orthodox and Catholic Churches. MASI was founded in 1986 at Catholic Theological Union in Chicago and moved to Ottawa in 1990, becoming an academic unit of the Faculty of Theology in 1992.

The Institute specializes in Eastern Christian Studies, with special but not exclusive emphasis on the tradition of the Church of Kyiv. Its main interests lie in the fields of the theology, liturgy, spirituality, history, and ecclesial polity of the Eastern Churches, both Orthodox and Catholic.

Through the Faculty of Theology, MASI offers undergraduate and graduate university degree programs in Eastern Christian Studies. MASI offers both civil and ecclesiastical Baccalaureates and a Certificate in Eastern Christian Studies at the undergraduate level. The graduate concentration includes ecclesiastical degree programs for the licentiate (L.Th.) and doctorate (D.Th.). Civil degree programs lead to an M.A.(Th.) and a Ph.D.(Th.). The four areas of study are: Spirituality-Doctrine, Liturgical Studies, Ecumenism and Eastern Christianity, and Historical Studies.

Since 1986 the Institute has offered a month-long summer intensive program in Eastern Christian Studies combined with an experience of monastic spirituality or community life in various North American locations. Since 1996, MASI also offers a summer session at the Holy Dormition Studite Monastery in Univ, Ukraine, in cooperation with the Ukrainian Catholic University. In 2006, the Institute introduced video-conference courses, and in 2009, online Internet courses. The Institute sponsors public lectures, offers continuing education programs for clergy, extends community outreach to several dioceses in North America and Ukraine, produces video and print materials for Eastern theological education, and provides consultative services for dioceses, school boards and parishes. MASI publishes a refereed journal, *Logos: A Journal of Eastern Christian Studies*, and two series of books: *Studies and Documents*.

The Sheptytsky Institute is endowed by the MASI Foundation, operating under the moral and financial auspices of the Ukrainian Catholic Bishops of Canada. The Peter and Doris Kule Chair of Eastern Theology and Spirituality was inaugurated in 1994. The Kule Family Chair of Eastern Christian Liturgy was established in 1997. At least four endowed professorships are envisioned for the Eastern Christian Studies programs at the Sheptytsky Institute.

A vital part of the mission of the Institute is accomplished through its Byzantine Rite Chapel of Sts. Joachim and Anna, where members of the University community participate in the liturgical life of the Eastern Churches in English, French, Ukrainian, Greek and other languages. All are welcome.

The Chapel and offices of the Metropolitan Andrey Sheptytsky Institute of Eastern Christian Studies are located on the second floor of Laframboise Hall, 249 Main Street.

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FIELD PLACEMENT: OBSERVERSHIPS, INTERNSHIPS, AND PRACTICA

For Anglican students who are postulants for ordination, the observerships, internships, and practica will normally take place in parishes of the Diocese of Ottawa.

Two years before entering the M.P.Th. program (i.e. year one of Profile A or year two of Profile B), postulants for ordination will participate in two observerships in two different parish settings. The parish setting will be determined by the field placement supervisor of the Anglican Studies Program in consultation with the student. The purpose of the observership is to broaden the student's experience of parish life. The observerships will not exceed four hours a week. The observerships, while not credited by the University, remain integral to the Anglican Studies Program. The observership may be combined with THO 3171 Introduction to Pastoral Practice I (Prerequisite: 9 cr. THO).

One year before entering the M.P.Th. program (i.e. year two of Profile A or year three of Profile B) postulants for ordination will participate in an internship in a parish. The focus of this internship will be largely the life of a parish on Sundays, giving the student an opportunity to develop liturgical, preaching, and pastoral skills. This internship will not exceed six hours a week. The parish setting will be determined by the field placement supervisor of the Anglican Studies Program in consultation with the student. The internship, while not credited by the University, remains integral to the Anglican Studies Program. The internship may be combined with THO 3109 Introduction to Pastoral Practice II.

LITURGY AND COMMUNITY LIFE

Theological and pastoral formation in the Anglican Studies Program occurs within the context of a worshipping community. All Anglicans are invited (and postulants for ordination are

expected) to participate in the regular liturgical life of the Anglican Community at Saint Paul University, as well as in extra-curricular activities such as retreats, quiet days, and workshops.

Some of the above courses are offered through the Faculty of Philosophy at Saint Paul University. Students who need to take

more courses in philosophy can take courses at the University of Ottawa, at no additional cost to full-time students.

This double specialization program favours a profound study of the two related fields, theology and philosophy, and prepares for the study of these subjects at the graduate level.

The program consists in a basic formation (6 cr.), a specialized formation in philosophy (48 cr.) and theology (48 cr.), and courses of a general nature (18 cr.).

Graduate Studies Programs

PROGRAMS' STRUCTURE OF THE GRADUATE STUDIES

The Faculty of Theology offers four graduate studies research programs which lead either to civil (M.A.(Th.), Ph.D.(Th.)) or ecclesiastical (L.Th., D.Th.) degrees. In each program, students register in one of the following five concentrations: Biblical Studies, Ethics, Systematic and Historical Theology, Spirituality, or Eastern Christian Studies.

These graduate studies programs are bilingual in all concentrations except for courses specific to the Eastern Christian Studies concentration, which are normally only offered in English.

Those who meet the admission requirements for both a civil and an ecclesiastical degree may pursue both simultaneously.

The Faculty also offers three graduate studies programs of a more professional nature, which lead to civil degrees of Master of Practical Theology (M.P.Th.), Master of Religious Education (M.R.E.), and Doctor of Ministry (D.Min.). The M.P.Th. is offered in English or in French, the M.R.E. is offered only in English, and the D.Min. is a bilingual program.

GENERAL DESCRIPTIONS OF THE CONCENTRATIONS

BIBLICAL STUDIES

Responsible interpretation of religious texts is essential in today's world. What bearing does the Bible have on the various social questions and issues? Students trained in the interpretation of Biblical texts at the Faculty of Theology will be equipped to engage in a rigorous study of sacred Christian texts through critical interpretive methodologies. Over the course of their study, they will become acquainted with, and eventually specialize in, a multiplicity of methods and approaches, and they will also learn Greek and Hebrew, essential biblical languages.

Career Opportunities

Pastoral work in parishes, hospitals, schools, prisons, etc.; work in diocesan centres or various organizations such as Bishop's Conferences; publishing, especially in presses with a religion section; university teaching and research; research or writing for religious and secular media.

ETHICS

Ethics explores the nature and the implications of ethical decisions in general or related to specific areas such as bioethics, sexual ethics, business ethics, workplace ethics, etc. In ethics, with input from the human sciences and the Christian faith, one focuses on the study of values and norms as these inform human activity, and on the nature and implications of ethical decision-making, either in general or with regard to particular ethical questions. Graduates will be well prepared to respond to the need for expertise and competence in all areas of society.

Career Opportunities

Resource person, expert or consultant in hospitals, agencies, government services, professional organizations, companies, or in the business world; college or university professor.

SYSTEMATIC AND HISTORICAL THEOLOGY

Systematic theology reflects on the faith experience and engages in inter-disciplinary dialogue in order to reflect on core beliefs in God, Christ, the Church, the ultimate outcome of life itself. It reflects on how we develop truthful meaning about the basic challenges that human persons are confronted to in their day to day existence. Historical theology illustrates how the Church grows and changes throughout time in response to social, cultural, political, and

economic factors. The study of earlier believing communities can help envision new possibilities in response to the challenges today's faith and human communities are facing.

Career Opportunities

High school teacher or university professor or researcher; journalist, researcher; interreligious and ecumenical dialogue consultant or theological advisor to bishops or Church-related organizations, and in the business world.

SPIRITUALITY

Spirituality is the field of studies that critically examines both the human openness to God, to the Transcendent or the Beyond, and the way in which this relationship is lived. This field, which has as its goal a deepened comprehension of the spiritual dimension of the human person and of human communities, is characterized by a genuine openness to the spiritual traditions arising within the various religions of the world. It focuses for example on historical and theological aspects of Christian spirituality, current trends in spirituality, spirituality and psychology, mysticism, interreligious dialogue, gender studies, ecology, and justice. People everywhere are experiencing a spiritual hunger, and this discipline provides both knowledge and nourishment.

Career Opportunities

University researcher or professor; counsellor or spiritual director; essential complementary formation for teachers of religion, pastoral and guidance counsellors, psychotherapists, chaplains.

EASTERN CHRISTIAN STUDIES

The concentration in Eastern Christian Studies in the Faculty of Theology is offered through the Metropolitan Andrey Sheptytsky Institute. The program offers students an opportunity to experience the diversity of the Eastern Christian tradition, to deepen their understanding of the relationship between Eastern and Western forms of Christianity, and to explore the commitment of the Churches to ecumenical and inter-religious dialogue. There is a special but not exclusive emphasis on the tradition of the Church of Kyiv. Students are prepared to reflect, through study and prayer, on the Christian faith through the historical, theological, spiritual and liturgical lens of the Eastern Churches, both Orthodox and Catholic. Graduate students deepen their understanding of these areas and refine their skills in research, analysis, and exposition.

Ordained ministry; parish or eparchial lay leadership; Catholic school religious education or chaplaincy; Christian journalism; secular positions involving cultural and inter-religious sensitivity towards Eastern Europe and the Middle East; professor; researcher; media analyst; school board consultant; advisor to bishops or Church-related organizations; expert for governmental or international organizations.

MASTER OF ARTS IN THEOLOGY (M.A.(Th.))

The M.A.(Th.) is a 30-credit program intended for candidates who already have a solid undergraduate formation in theology which includes courses in various areas of theology such as systematic theology, history, biblical studies, ethics, and spirituality. It is designed to allow these students to gain greater familiarity with the various research methods in theology and to begin a specialization in a particular area of theological disciplines, while promoting an integration of the theological formation already acquired.

Graduate programs normally have a residency requirement, where residence is defined as the period in which the student is registered full-time at the Faculty of Theology. This requirement must be met ordinarily at the beginning of the program. For the M.A.(Th.), its duration is of three—usually consecutive—terms. ADMISSION PROCEDURES AND REQUIREMENTS SPECIFIC TO THE PROGRAM

In addition to the common admission procedures specified on page B2, the additional documents and requirements for admission are:

1. the candidate must hold a honours bachelor (60 credits in theology) or its equivalent with minimum second class standing (“B” average);
2. the candidate must have a mastery of one of the two official languages of Canada and have a passive knowledge (ability to read and to follow lectures) of the other. Evidence of the passive knowledge of the other official language must be provided with the request for admission. Details are to be found at www.ustpaul.ca/theology, under “Process of Admission”;
3. two confidential letters of reference written by persons from the academic world must be provided with the request for admission. The model is available at www.ustpaul.ca/theology, under “Process of Admission”;
4. the candidate registers in a concentration (Biblical Studies, Ethics, Systematic and Historical Theology, Spirituality, Eastern Christian Studies). To be admitted to a particular concentration, the candidate must have demonstrated a certain level of knowledge in the chosen concentration;
5. to be admitted in the Biblical Studies concentration, a candidate must have basic knowledge (Introduction — Part 1) of Hebrew and of Greek;
6. a candidate who registers in Eastern Christian Studies must have basic knowledge of Greek.

LICENTIATE IN THEOLOGY – ECCLESIASTICAL (L.Th.)

The L.Th. (also known as the *Sacrae Theologiae Licentiatu*s, S.T.L.) is an ecclesiastical degree granted by Saint Paul University by virtue of its pontifical charter. The L.Th. is a 51-credit program structured identically in all concentrations.

Graduate programs normally have a residency requirement, where residence is defined as the period in which the student is registered full-time at the Faculty of Theology. This requirement must be met generally at the beginning of the program. For the L.Th., its duration is of three—usually consecutive—terms. Details are to be found at www.ustpaul.ca/theology, under “Academic Regulations”.

ADMISSION PROCEDURES AND REQUIREMENTS SPECIFIC TO THE PROGRAM

In addition to the common admission procedures specified on page B2, the additional documents and requirements for admission are:

1. the candidate must hold an ecclesiastical B.Th. with minimum second class standing (“B” average);
2. the candidate must have a mastery of one of the two official languages of Canada and have a passive knowledge (ability to read and to follow lectures) of the other. Evidence of the passive knowledge of the other official language must be provided with the request for admission. Details are to be found at www.ustpaul.ca/theology, under “Process of Admission”;
3. two confidential letters of reference written by persons from the academic world must be provided with the request for admission. The model is available at www.ustpaul.ca/theology, under “Process of Admission”;
4. the candidate registers in a concentration (Biblical Studies, Ethics, Systematic and Historical Theology, Spirituality, Eastern Christian Studies). To be admitted to a particular concentration, the candidate must have demonstrated a certain knowledge in the chosen concentration;
5. to be admitted to the L.Th. program, the candidate must have sufficient knowledge of Latin (Level I — Introduction);
6. to be admitted in the Biblical Studies concentration, a candidate must have basic knowledge (Introduction — Part 1) of Hebrew and of Greek;
7. to be admitted to the second year of the L.Th. program in Eastern Christian Studies, the candidate must also have sufficient knowledge of Greek. Other ancient or modern languages may be required depending on the area of research chosen.

MASTER IN PASTORAL THEOLOGY (M.P.Th.)

The M.P.Th. is a 30-credit program that offers women and men of various Christian traditions a milieu for practical ministry formation founded on theological reflection. The program aims to enable students to discern the sociological and psychological dimensions of specific communities and to integrate spiritual life within these dimensions. The learning process includes supervised ministry.

Graduate programs normally have a residency requirement, where residence is defined as the period in which the student is registered full-time at the Faculty of Theology. This requirement must be met ordinarily at the beginning of the program. For the M.P.Th., its duration is of three—usually consecutive—terms. Details are to be found at www.ustpaul.ca/theology, under “Academic Regulations”.

ANGLICAN STUDIES PROFILE

The M.P.Th. is an integral part of the formation within the Anglican Studies Program. The successful completion of the M.P.Th. degree is required for ordination to the priesthood in the Anglican Diocese of Ottawa.

The M.P.Th. includes two credited and supervised practica. The parish setting for postulants will be determined by the Director of the M.P.Th. program, in consultation with the field placement supervisor of the Anglican Studies Program. (N.B. The placement setting for Anglicans in the M.P.Th. program who are not postulants will be determined by the Director of the M.P.Th. program.)

While the student will fulfill the requirements of the M.P.Th. practica, he will also work with the incumbent of the parish and the Lay Support Groups, who will submit a separate evaluation to the coordinator of the Anglican Studies Program, which will be forwarded to the prospective diocese, upon request.

LITURGY AND COMMUNITY LIFE

Theological and pastoral formation in the Anglican Studies Program occurs within the context of a worshipping community. All Anglicans are invited (and postulants for ordination are expected) to participate in the regular liturgical life of the Anglican Community at Saint Paul University, as well as extra-curricular activities such as retreats, quiet days, and workshops.

PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS – M.P.Th. ANGLICAN STUDIES PROFILE

The course requirements for the Anglican Studies Profile of the M.P.Th. are identical to those of the M.P.Th., as described in the previous section, with one exception: DCA 5310 Canonical Pastoral

Theology is not an available option for students in the Anglican Studies Program.

MASTER IN RELIGIOUS EDUCATION (M.R.E.)

The M.R.E. is a 30-credit program that consists of two modules: a theological module (15 cr.) and a religious education module (15 cr.). It is offered on a part-time basis and takes three years to complete. All courses are offered on-line and candidates are only required to participate in one weekend session per course, which is scheduled to fit the needs of the candidates registered in the course.

The M.R.E. seeks to form competent teachers of religious education both in the school system and in parish or diocesan settings. It offers the development of leadership skills for educating in faith.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS SPECIFIC TO THE PROGRAM

The candidate must submit official transcripts (or other documents) which attest that the following conditions have been fulfilled:

1. completion of a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution with minimum second class standing ("B" average);
2. possession of a B.Ed. (or teacher's certificate) or completion of five three-credit courses in the field of Education;
3. completion of five three-credit courses in the field of theology (including an Introduction to the Old Testament and an Introduction to the New Testament). An Additional Qualification Specialist in Religious Education Certificate is considered the equivalent of two three-credit courses.

THE MASTER IN RELIGIOUS EDUCATION (M.R.E.) PROJECT

The M.R.E. Project is the culminating activity for the M.R.E. Degree. Participants prepare and design a project which brings together their learning experiences and a key aspect of their educational praxis. They do this in a peer learning environment with the direction and support of the trainer/supervisor.

DOCTORATE IN THEOLOGY – CIVIL (PH.D.(TH.))

The Ph.D.(Th.) program is intended to promote specialization in a particular field and development of skills pertinent to that field. It likewise aims to develop the student's research capabilities. The structure of the Ph.D.(Th.) is identical for all concentrations.

Graduate programs normally have a residency requirement, where residence is defined as the period in which the student is registered full-time at the Faculty of Theology. This requirement must be met generally at the beginning of the program. For the Ph.D.(Th.), its duration is of six—usually consecutive—terms. Details are to be found at www.ustpaul.ca/theology, under "Academic Regulations".

ADMISSION PROCEDURES AND REQUIREMENTS SPECIFIC TO THE PROGRAM

In addition to the common admission procedures specified at page B2, the additional documents and requirements for admission are:

1. the candidate must hold a M.A.(Th.) degree from the University of Ottawa/Saint Paul University with high second class standing ("B+") or its equivalent;
2. among the applicants who meet this requirement, only those whose academic record gives assurance that they are able to succeed and to make an original contribution to the field of theological studies will be accepted as candidates to the doctorate;
3. the candidate must be proficient in one of the two official languages of Canada and have a have passive knowledge (ability to read and to follow lectures) of the other. 4. two confidential letters of reference written by persons from the academic world must be provided with the request for admission. The model is available at www.ustpaul.ca/theology, under "Process of Admission";
5. a description of his or her proposed area of research. The candidate must submit a description of his proposed area of research. Candidates should take into consideration the areas in which Faculty members are competent. The form is available at www.ustpaul.ca/theology, under "Process of Admission";
6. the candidate registers in a concentration (Biblical Studies, Ethics, Systematic and Historical Theology, Spirituality, Eastern Christian Studies). To be admitted to a particular concentration, the candidate must have demonstrated a certain knowledge in the chosen concentration;
7. to be admitted to the Biblical Studies concentration, a candidate must have prerequisite knowledge (Introduction – Part 1) of Hebrew and of Greek, and must acquire a further level of competence in Hebrew and Greek (Intermediate – Part 2) before the thesis project presentation;
8. the Faculty may require a candidate to acquire certain skills deemed necessary for the achievement of his research project (e.g. knowledge of a language, initiation in other disciplines, etc.).

DOCTORATE IN THEOLOGY – ECCLESIASTICAL (D.Th.)

The D.Th. (also known as the *Sacrae Theologiae Doctor*, S.T.D.) is an ecclesiastical degree granted by Saint Paul University by virtue of its pontifical charter. The structure of the D.Th. is identical for all concentrations.

Graduate programs normally have a residency requirement, where residence is defined as the period in which the student is registered full-time at the Faculty of Theology. This requirement must be met generally at the beginning of the program. For the D.Th., its duration is of six–normally consecutive–terms. Details are to be found at www.ustpaul.ca/theology, under “Academic Regulations”.

ADMISSION PROCEDURES AND REQUIREMENTS SPECIFIC TO THE PROGRAM

In addition to the common admission procedures specified on page B2, the additional documents and requirements for admission are:

1. the candidate must hold a Licentiate in Theology (L.Th.) from Saint Paul University with minimum high second class standing (“B+”);
2. the candidate must meet the admission requirements of the Ph.D.(Th.) program.

PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

1. a continuous (lasting two years) seminar which culminates with the presentation and final approval of the thesis project (THO 9295)
2. synthesis examination (THO 9998) – oral and written
3. submission and defence of a thesis (at least 200 pages)

Students who have not obtained the L.Th. from Saint Paul University must complete 12 credits in their concentration: 9 credits are to be selected from courses listed in the M.A.(Th.) program, as well as the directed readings course (THO 8311).

DOCTOR OF MINISTRY (D.Min.)

The D.Min. is a 36-credit program that combines theological reflection and social sciences research methods. The program is designed to give spiritual thinkers, leaders and professionals the knowledge and skills required to discern and promote models of ministry that favour collaboration and transformation, and that respond to the human values, the cultural expressions and the multiple dynamics of the contexts in which they work.

Graduate programs normally have a residency requirement, where residence is defined as the period in which the student is registered full-time at the Faculty of Theology. This requirement must be met generally at the beginning of the program. For the D.Min., its duration is of six–usually consecutive–terms. Details are to be found at www.ustpaul.ca/theology, under “Academic Regulations”.

Summer Sessions

SUMMER INSTITUTE IN PASTORAL LITURGY – NON DEGREE GRANTING PROGRAM

The Summer Institute in Pastoral Liturgy (SIPL) has been established in close cooperation with the National Liturgical Office of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops (CCCB). The aim of the Institute is to enable those who prepare, lead, and evaluate the liturgical activity of the Church to become more familiar with the various liturgical rites of the Church and develop skills useful for liturgical ministry.

Participants normally take three courses per summer. The completion over three summers of six core courses, three electives, and the practicum modules, leads to a Pastoral Certificate in Liturgy (Certificate of attendance given by the Faculty of Theology). Courses can also be taken for university level credits.

3. PRACTICUM MODULES

SUMMER INSTITUTE IN RELIGIOUS EDUCATION – NON DEGREE GRANTING PROGRAM

The aim of the Summer Institute in religious Education is to further the ministry of catechesis and religious education in the Church. The Institute intends to assist parents, parish catechists, directors of religious education, sacramental team members, leaders and facilitators of adult faith education, RCIA teams, and teachers of religion in schools to acquire the skills and the competence to teach a Christian life of faith and to communicate the Church's faith tradition.

Participants normally take three courses per summer. The completion over three summers of five core courses, four electives, and the practicum modules, leads to a Pastoral Certificate in Religious Education (Certificate of attendance given by the Faculty of Theology). Courses can also be taken for university level credits.

SIRE STRUCTURE

All participants must take Introduction to Liturgy and Foundations of Religious Education; Synthesis for Graduates (in their last session of study); and any two of the following:

SUMMER INTENSIVE PROGRAMS IN EASTERN CHRISTIAN STUDIES

Since 1987, the Metropolitan Andrey Sheptytsky Institute of Eastern Christian Studies has offered a unique four-week summer intensive program in both North America and in Ukraine, combining study of Eastern Christian theology, spirituality and liturgy with a lived experience of Eastern Christian monasticism or community life. Two courses (each carrying three university credits) are part of the program. Classroom work is augmented by participation in the liturgical life of the community. This may include up to three hours of liturgy a day, along with the fasts appropriate to the liturgical season. There are also field trips, which allow program participants to encounter various Eastern Catholic and Orthodox communities in the region. The program in North America is offered in English. The program in Ukraine is offered in Ukrainian.
