The table below provides examples of how to cite the most common types of sources used in undergraduate term papers in theology. It is based on the guidelines found in Kate L. Turabian, A Manual for Writers of Term Papers, Theses, and Dissertations, 7th ed. (Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 2007) with thanks to G. Pierre Ingram. Bold-face numbers refer to the section in Turabian.

GENERAL REMARKS

REMARK 1: A footnote is punctuated as if it were a single sentence, i.e. with one period at the end. A

bibliography entry is punctuated as if it were a series of sentences (with periods separating

the distinct elements of the reference).

REMARK 2: Mentioning subtitles and series titles in footnotes is optional.

CITING CHURCH DOCUMENTS

- It is customary to use the first two words of the Latin text (e.g., "Lumen gentium") to designate a Church document, but this tag does not replace the complete title, nor is it a subtitle. It is more like an appendage to the title. Complete titles include the specific classification of the document (e.g., constitution, decree, declaration, apostolic exhortation), as well as some indication of its subject. It is also helpful to include the date of promulgation by the competent authority—in square brackets after the title—in addition to the year of publication.
- Universally available authoritative works—such as the Bible, the Summa theologiae of St Thomas Aguinas, the Catechism of the Catholic Church, the Documents of Vatican II, and the Code of Canon Law—are not footnoted each and every time they are quoted. Rather, it is customary to use commonly accepted abbreviations, enclosed in parentheses, after a quoted passage in the body of a paper, However, because different editions and translations of these works exist, it would be helpful to the reader if you were to indicate—e.g. in a footnote after your first citation—which version you are using. If you are in fact using more than one translation (e.g. both the RSV and the NRSV), it is imperative that you indicate which one is being used for each citation.
- To distinguish them from page numbers, references to paragraph numbers or canons in the documents should accompany quotations in the body of the paper rather than in footnotes, e.g., "According to the Catechism, 'The golden rule helps one discern, in concrete situations, whether or not it would be appropriate to reveal the truth to someone who asks for it' (no. 2510).²⁴" Paragraph numbers may be preceded by the abbreviations "no." or "par.", or the symbol "§". The abbreviation for canon is "can."

CITING ELECTRONIC WORKS

The 7^{th} edition of Turabian is the first to have comprehensive information regarding electronic sources. See section 17.7. The basic format is:

LastName, FirstName. *Title of Print Version of Work*. Edition statement [if given]. Publication information [Place of publication: publisher, date], if given. *Title of Electronic Work*. Medium. Information supplier. Available protocol [if applicable]: site/path/file. Access date.

#. FirstName LastName, *Title of Print Version of Work*, edition statement [if given] (Publication information [Place of publication: publisher, date], if given), *Title of Electronic Work*, medium, information supplier, available protocol [if applicable]: site/path/file, access date.

- Often information is put on the Internet by organizations without citing a specific author. In such
 cases, ascribe authorship to the smallest identifiable organizational unit (e.g., Bishops' Committee on
 the Liturgy), or just start with the title of the electronic work.
- Only mention an "edition statement" if the document clearly states that the pages have been rewritten rather than just updated. Most www pages are updated on a regular basis.
- If the facts of publication are not provided on the web site itself, it is acceptable to omit them. Obviously, they cannot be given for electronic works that do not exist in print.
- The term "information supplier" refers to the organization responsible for maintaining the web site, such as the Holy See, the CCCB, etc.
- The "access date" is when you viewed, downloaded or printed the web page. This statement is
 necessary to allow for any subsequent changes which may be made to the page or if the page is no
 longer available.
