Title: Financial Aid and Scholarships to Students

1. Objective

This regulation determines the different forms of financial aid and scholarships Saint Paul University provides to its registered students.

2. Regulation

- 2.1 Every type of student financial aid and scholarship must be approved by the Associate Vice-Rectorate, Strategic Enrollment Management.
- 2.2 <u>Undergraduate Admission Scholarships, including Second-Entry Programs</u>: Admission scholarships are offered to Canadian, permanent resident and international students from recognized high schools and colleges only, based on the following scale:

Average upon registration	Total value*	
95 to 100%	\$3,000	
90 to 94.9%	\$2,000	
85 to 89.9%	\$1,000	
80 to 84.9%	\$500	

These scholarships are awarded automatically and are not renewable.

Students applying to a certificate program or general BA program are not eligible.

*Note: Saint Paul University's tuition fees for Canadian students are on average \$1,000 less per year than at other Ontario universities, and several thousand dollars less for international students.

2.3 <u>Graduate Studies Admission Scholarships</u>: Admission scholarships are offered to Canadian, permanent resident and international students with an average upon registration of at least 85% and who will be pursuing their studies full-time, based on the following scale:

Program	Average upon registration	Duration and amount	Total value
Master's	85%	3 terms × \$2,000	\$6,000
Doctorate	85%	12 terms × \$2,500	\$30,000

These scholarships are awarded automatically.

Candidates applying for a Graduate Diploma (GD) are also eligible for admission scholarships as long as they meet the conditions listed above (registration for full-time studies and average of at least 85%). However, should they subsequently decide to pursue their studies at the Master's level, any funding received toward the Graduate Diploma will be deducted from the total scholarship amount for the Master's Degree.

- 2.4 <u>Designated Scholarships</u>: Several scholarships with varying amounts and number each year, having specific conditions depending on the students' country of origin, marital or religious status, academic performance, and subject of academic research or study projects. These scholarships are awarded on competition, details of which are posted on the University website.
- 2.5 <u>Financial Aid Bursaries</u>: The criteria for awarding these bursaries are based primarily on the demonstrated financial need and the confirmed academic achievement of the student. The conditions for granting these bursaries are posted on the University website.
