Individual Development Plan

For Postdoctoral Fellows



Overview

The beginning of your postdoctoral appointment is the best time for you and your adviser to outline your tenure expectations. Recent studies on postdoctoral experiences and outcomes have shown that a non-binding yet formal plan increases the productivity of the postdoctoral fellow and boosts the relationship between the postdoc and their adviser in terms of mutual expectations.^[1, 2]

Postdocs with a formal plan reported [2]:

- 23% increase in their publication rates in peer-reviewed journals
- 30% higher rate of first-authored articles
- 25% increase in grant proposal submissions

In describing the overall experience during their appointment, 20% of postdocs without a formal plan felt their advisers did not meet their expectations, while only 5% of postdocs expressed feelings of dissatisfaction with a formal plan in place [2]. Many reports and findings show that the overall postdoctoral experience is improved by access to additional training and opportunities. [3, 4] In light of this, the University of Ottawa has made considerable training opportunities available for its postdocs. As a first step, the University of Ottawa Postdoctoral Association (UOPDA) developed this **Individual Development Plan** (IDP), which is designed to help share and align the expectations of postdocs and their advisors.

The first step in filling out this plan is for you to reflect on the questions listed on the following pages and provide answers in the middle column. Since the role of a postdoc varies significantly between faculties, some questions may not be applicable. You then give the completed form to your adviser, so your adviser can review your responses and make additional comments in the right-hand column.

The **Past Experience** section is a summary of your activities before starting your postdoctoral research with your current group and gives your new adviser an opportunity to review your goals and your experience level in order to determine where it would be best for you to focus your attention or to assess the time you would take to attain your goals (in particular, teaching).

Before signing the form, it's important that you and your adviser meet to discuss your responses. We would like to emphasize that the IDP is a non-binding document and, as such, signing the IDP does not contractually oblige you or your advisor to meet any goals indicated in the IDP. Again, be aware that not all questions will apply to all postdocs.
